LIVE AT NEW ORLEANS' ORPHEUM THEATER FRIDAY, JUNE 6, AT 7:30 PM

ONE-NIGHT-ONLY PERFORMANCE HONORS THE ANNIVERSARY OF D-DAY AND CELEBRATES THE NATIONAL WWII MUSEUM'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY

FOLLOWING SOLD-OUT PERFORMANCES AT CARNEGIE HALL, KENNEDY CENTER AND BOSTON'S SYMPHONY HALL, HISTORIAN JOHN MONSKY TAKES THE STAGE WITH TOP BROADWAY VOCALISTS, THE LOUISIANA PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA, HISTORIC FLAGS AND RARELY SEEN ARCHIVAL FILM AND FOOTAGE

New Orleans, LA (Wednesday, May XX, 2025) – On Friday, June 6 — the exact date of the D-Day landings 81 years ago — the acclaimed multimedia production *The Eyes of the World: From D-Day to VE Day* takes the stage at New Orleans' **Orpheum Theater** for a special one-night-only performance in recognition of The National WWII Museum's 25th anniversary.

The Eyes of the World: From D-Day to VE Day recreates the harrowing final 11 months of World War II in Europe — from the beaches of Normandy and the liberation of Paris to the fall of Berlin — through a musically driven performance with the **Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra** conducted by **Ian Weinberger**, music director of *Hamilton* on Broadway. Accompanied by narration from historian **John Monsky**, the production is performed live with Broadway stars from *Choir Boy, Mean Girls, My Fair Lady*, and *Company*, and features archival footage and photography from the National Archives.

This innovative and immersive event brings World War II to life through the lens of warriors and journalists, both famous and forgotten, who experienced the drama, heartbreak, and triumph of the war. Rarely seen material culture — including battlefield flags carried ashore onto the beaches of Normandy, paving the way to victory — further illuminates stories often lost to history.

Using the words and images of Ernest Hemingway, *LIFE* magazine daredevil war photographer Robert Capa, *Vogue* model-turned-photojournalist Lee Miller, and a young soldier named Jerry who landed on Utah Beach on June 6, 1944, Monsky leads audiences through the events that brought these figures face to face with the action. Their paths intersect as they report on the war, trying to stay alive in their search for the truth. And maybe, even save the world.

Along the way, they cross paths with Hemingway's estranged wife, war correspondent journalist Martha Gellhorn; General Dwight D. Eisenhower; Pablo Picasso; Marlene Dietrich; the heroic 761st Tank Battalion ("The Black Panthers"); and the 6888th ("Six Triple

Eight") Central Postal Directory Battalion, among others.

The program also highlights New Orleans' vital role in World War II — a city that faced danger firsthand as waves of German U-boats prowled the Gulf South region, bringing the global conflict to America's shores. In response, New Orleanians showed bravery and resilience, transforming the city into a key shipbuilding powerhouse, producing over 20,000 amphibious landing craft used in every major Allied invasion.

Monsky said, "New Orleans is where the U.S. built the boats that helped win the war, and it's home to the institution that preserves the war's legacy — The National WWII Museum. There is no better place to remember D-Day and honor the bravery of those boys who stormed the beaches of Normandy and fought for freedom 81 years ago. Bringing *The Eyes of the World* to this city, as the Museum celebrates 25 years, is both an honor and a homecoming."

Joining Monsky on stage are Broadway stars **Shereen Ahmed** (*My Fair Lady*), **John Clay III** (*Choir Boy*), **Kate Rockwell** (*Mean Girls*), and **Nicholas Rodriguez** (*Company*). **Ian Weinberger**, music director of *Hamilton* on Broadway, is music supervisor, arranger and conductor of the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra. The score features period music from Edith Piaf, Irving Berlin, Aaron Copland and more.

The program, which has sold out premier venues including Boston's Symphony Hall, Carnegie Hall, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and Miami's New World Center, comes to New Orleans' Orpheum Theater thanks to The National WWII Museum and is presented by Priddy Family Foundation.

"We are thrilled to partner with John Monsky and the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra to bring *The Eyes of the World* to New Orleans," said Stephen J. Watson, President & CEO of The National WWII Museum. "The Museum remains committed to sharing the stories of the WWII generation on our campus, online, and in communities across the country through educational programs and partnerships like this so that the war's history continues to educate and inspire for generations to come."

The National WWII Museum opened as The National D-Day Museum on June 6, 2000 — the 56th anniversary of the Normandy landings — as a single exhibition hall dedicated to telling the stories of the everyday Americans who participated in the greatest amphibious invasion in history. In 2004, Congress designated the institution as America's national museum for World War II, and the institution officially adopted a new name and mission. Now, 25 transformational years later, The National WWII Museum explores and honors the entire American experience in World War II — why it was fought, how it was won, and what it means today — on its seven-acre, seven-pavilion campus with immersive exhibits, multimedia experiences, and an expansive collection of powerful artifacts and first-person oral histories.

In recognition of its 25th anniversary and to highlight the continued importance of its mission, the Museum is hosting a slate of celebratory events on its campus and in the City of New Orleans through June 7. The celebration will reflect on the Museum's achievements, share how the institution plans to expand its educational efforts, and recognize the WWII generation as it welcomes veterans, Home Front workers and Holocaust survivors to the museum that was built in their honor and continues sharing their stories.

ABOUT JOHN MONSKY

John Monsky is the creator, writer, and narrator of the American History Unbound series. His reverence for historical ephemera is at the core of his productions, with his meticulous research of flags and other tangible objects driving his narratives that explore landmark events in our history.

His lectures for the Carnegie Hall Presents series include *The Vietnam War: At Home and Abroad, We Chose to Go to the Moon, The Eyes of the World: From D-Day to VE Day,* and *The Great War & The Great Gatsby.* In 2019, Monsky was honored by The New York Historical, where he has developed and workshopped many of his lectures and currently serves on the board of trustees. He has appeared on CNN, CBS, and NBC, and also

serves on the board of directors of Rockefeller University and Yale University Art Gallery.

His flag collection, which he began in his boyhood, is nationally recognized and has been reported on in *The New Yorker*, *Art & Antiques Magazine*, and other publications. His historical research on George Washington has appeared in the *Winterthur Portfolio*.

Monsky graduated from Yale College as a history major, where he was awarded the White Prize in History and the DeForest Oratory Prize.

After attending Harvard Law School and working as a law clerk, he served as an attorney for the U.S. Senate Congressional Committee investigating the Iran-Contra affair. Monsky, an historian and lawyer, is a senior partner at Oak Hill Capital, an investment firm. He lives in New York City with his wife, Jennifer Weis. They have four children — Harrison, Annabel, Gillian, and Caitlin — and a dog named Flyer.

This summer, Monsky co-curated *Independency: The American Flag at 250 Years*, an exhibition at New York's Southampton Arts Center featuring his collection of historic American flags and textiles, presented alongside abstract works by abstract painter Sean Scully. The exhibition will be on view from May 17 through July 19, 2025.

A B O U T THE LOUISIANA PHILHARMONIC

The Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra (LPO) is dedicated to maintaining live orchestral music and a full-scale symphonic orchestra as an integral part of the cultural and educational life of the New Orleans area, the entire state of Louisiana, and the Gulf South region. Formed in 1991, the LPO is the oldest full-time musician-governed and collaboratively operated orchestra in the United States.
